From the Pastor's Desk

The Before and the After

There are certain events that stand as a marker in time. For many of us September 11, 2001 was one of those events. There was life before the towers fell in New York and then there was life after. One era ended and another began. One day we felt nigh invincible as a nation and the next we realized how vulnerable we were. We mourned the lives lost and much of the world mourned with us. Many young people decided they wanted to serve in the U.S. military. Air travel changed substantially. That was the after.

I recently read a book my husband picked up at the Green Valley Book Fair because it had a picture of a pug on the cover. It was *The Pug List* by Alison Hodgson and it begins with a very serious event. Alison's house is set on fire while she and her whole family are asleep. Almost everything is lost in the fire. She goes on to write about how her whole family's life is divided into two parts by this event: there is before the fire and after the fire.

Of course, we have reached the one-year anniversary of several dates related to the pandemic. On January 20, 2020 the World Health Organization declared a global health emergency of international concern. On February 29, 2020 the United States reported the first death from COVID-19 and on March 15, 2020 the Center for Disease Control recommended gatherings not exceed 50 people for the following eight weeks. This global pandemic has a before but we are still waiting to see what the after will be like.

As I write this, we are still in the season of Lent, a season of preparation. But my sights are set on Easter. Easter was one of those before and after moments in history. When the women came and found the stone rolled away from the tomb where Jesus' body had been lain, everything changed. It would take time for many to recognize they were living in an after moment, but the news of the risen Christ began to spread.

Paul writes in his letter to the Ephesians, "He [Jesus Christ] has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, ¹⁶ and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. ¹⁷So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; ¹⁸for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. ¹⁹So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:15-19).

The before was adherence to the law. It was death and it was division. The after was life eternal, grace and unity. We may not understand all things, but we can rely on these three things that God wants us to have abundant life, boundless love and unity in the Spirit.

Whatever "after COVID" looks like, I know that I can claim the gifts God gave us through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And that is worth celebrating.

Thoughts from a Member ...

As I reflect back on the past year, I think about the impact COVID has had on my life and job. When I retired from public school administration in 2015, I started working for JMU as a University Supervisor. In this position, I go out to

the public schools and work with student teachers. I observe them teaching, and hopefully, I offer some suggestions and ideas to help them improve their teaching skills.

Whether or not you have children or grandchildren in school, you are probably aware of the huge impact the virus has had on education. Some of my students have been assigned to a hybrid setting. They are teaching students in person, but classes are smaller because students attend only two days a week. Some

student teachers are teaching virtually from school, while others are teaching virtually from home. When these students started the teacher preparation program, they had no idea how different student teaching would be from the "norm." Even with all of the uncertainty and anxiety these student teachers have experienced, one thing I have continued to see among all of my students teachers, is excitement and enthusiasm. Even though this experience has been different than they anticipated, they have maintained a positive attitude and desire to do the best they can. They haven't whined and complained about the

> situation, the restrictions, or even the expectation to clean and sanitize throughout the classroom during the day. Whatever their modality of instruction has been, they have remained positive and have made the best of the situation.

I think about how this attitude can impact all aspects of our life. The pandemic has changed all of our lives, in some way. Hopefully, we can be like my JMU students and keep a positive attitude and maintain some enthusiasm

and excitement for the things we are able to do and continue to make the best of the situation.
