

From the Pastor's Desk

Who Is My Neighbor?

Luke 10:30-37

Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."



One of my favorite religious authors is Eckhart Tolle. I have found great wisdom in his writings. One of the things he writes about is the spiritual nature of "relationships" with other people. On this topic, one of my favorite quotes is the following: "If her past were your past, her pain your pain, her level of consciousness your level of consciousness, you would think and act exactly as she does. With this realization comes forgiveness, compassion and peace." ("Stillness Speaks", Eckhart Tolle)

In other words, folks can't really help being who they are. And keeping this in mind might help us get along better with those who think and act differently than us. It might help us to be more forgiving, understanding, and compassionate with others. Especially those we may disagree with.

This is an important thing for us to remember in the United Methodist Church. Because we are a "big tent" denomination we naturally have a variety of opinions on different subjects. And one of these subjects is just how far to take this whole neighbor thing. We seem to be still asking the age-old question, "who is my neighbor?"

Which brings us to the story of the Good Samaritan (see above). A text note in my NIV Study Bible states that, in the story of the Good Samaritan "It is significant that the person Jesus commended was neither the religious leader nor the lay

associate, but a hated foreigner. Jews viewed Samaritans as half-breeds, both physically and spiritually.
Samaritans and Jews practiced open hostility, but Jesus asserted that love knows no national boundaries."
Love should know no national boundaries, nor any other kinds of boundaries for that matter. That is not just my opinion. It is a matter of record in scripture (aka The Holy Word of God).

Have you ever noticed how many stories Jesus tells about outsiders being in, insiders being out, the first last, and the last first? That's why some have referred to this topsy-turvy world as "The Upside Down Kingdom".

One thing we can be sure of. Jesus was all about breaking down barriers and not building them up. He ate with sinners and tax collectors. He touched lepers. He rubbed spit in a blind man's eye. He healed on the sabbath. He talked to women (even Samaritan women!). He wasn't very good at following the social norms of his day. He always put LOVE first. He always put the people first. He treated each one (regardless of their baggage) as if they were sacred children of God. And they were! As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to do the same.

Stewardship: It's More Than Giving Money by Randy Roller

"As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." (1 Peter 4: 10)

When you see the word 'stewardship,' you might think, "Oh boy, here's another article about giving money to the church!" Yes, money is important. We need it to keep the lights on and pay our pastor but stewardship is more than giving dollars. As the Bethany church family, we believe that through our relationship with Jesus Christ, we desire to serve and love our neighbor.

How do we respond to God's call to serve and love our neighbors? We faithfully steward the gifts God has so abundantly given to us. Although some think of stewardship as only a financial response to God's love, stewardship encompasses so much more than money. It is about how we use all that God has entrusted to our care – our time, our talents, and our treasures – to love God and our neighbors, both inside and outside of the church walls and our homes. It is really a heart issue – a longing to offer everything we are and have to Him.

In his essay entitled, *Leadership is Stewardship*, Bill Peel suggests there are four important principles about biblical stewardship we should understand:

1. The principle of ownership. In Psalm 24, the psalmist begins with: "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." This principle is fundamental to stewardship. God owns everything. We are simply managers or administrators acting on his behalf. C. S. Lewis in his book Mere Christianity put it this way: "Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every



moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already."

- 2. The principle of responsibility. Mr. Peel explains that although God gives us "all things richly to enjoy," nothing is ours or really belongs to us. God owns everything and we are responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it. We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. While God graciously entrusted us with the care, development, and enjoyment of everything, we are responsible to manage his holdings well and according to his desires and purposes.
- 3. The principle of accountability. A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities, and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care, and one day each one of us will be called to give an account for how we have managed what the Master has given to us. Like the servants in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25), we need to take advantage of every opportunity to be good stewards of that which God has entrusted to us.
- 4. The principle of reward. It goes without saying that we do not practice stewardship merely for the sake of getting a reward. We are good stewards because Christ has placed it in our hearts to do so. In Colossians 3: 23-24, Paul writes: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." Mr. Peel goes on to state that the Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the master's will with the master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life, but fully in the next. That's something to ponder.

As Christians in the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important. From this viewpoint, everything we do connects with what God is doing in the world. Let us be faithful stewards of all God has given us while growing in our faith and ability to be used by God to advance His Kingdom.

You pick an envelope with a child's name, age, and gift that they want. Kingsway Ministries gives us this list from incarcerated parents that need help giving their kids gift while they are away. We have worked with Kingsway

Ministries for many years in providing presents to these dear children. There are lots of churches and organizations that help provide this service. So, be on the lookout for this mission project.

Next up, we will have a fundraiser to help the Gideons collect money to purchase bibles to help spread the word of God. When we think about Christmas time, we think of presents. This will be a way for our youth to purchase a present for God. You give \$5 (which buys a Gideon regular bible or 3 small pocket size bibles) and you will receive an ornament that you put your name on and place on the small Christmas tree that we will have in the narthex. You can ask your family and friends for the \$5 donation to help purchase Bibles. We want to see how full we can make this tree of these Gideon ornaments.

On Saturday, December 4th, we have signed up to ring the bell for the Salvation Army at the Shenandoah Valley Heritage Market. The times are from 10am -6pm. If you would like to sign up for an hour time slot, just let me know. If you can't do that day, then just contact me and we can find a day, time, and place that works for you to sign up and ring the bell for such a great cause.

We are still taking gently used clothing donations for the Green Hanger Project all year. Make sure to label your box or bag with "Green Hanger". No holes or stains, please. You can also donate personal hygiene items,

In addition to services provided within the prisons and jails, Kingsway provides a safe haven for released inmates to come for help at the office in Harrisonburg, Virginia. We help Kingsway with

buying Christmas gifts for the children of incarcerated parents through the Apple Tree Gifts. We also helped them, pre-COVID, when we all ran around the gym, grabbing cards and stuffing them into paper bags for those in jail to have cards to mail out to their loved ones.
